# Teaching and learning aims

At the end of the lesson pupils will be able to:

- Creative Exploration:

# Learning outcomes (4 Cs)

## **Activities**

Step 1: Introduction to Lines in Art (15 minutes):





## - Teacher's Explanation:

"Today, we will explore the fascinating world oflines in art. Let's discover the power of lines to convey emotions and create visual interest!"

## - Activity: Drawing Expressive Lines

- Students practice different types of lines to understand their visual impact and emotionalexpression.
- As a resource for this activity, you can give them one of the three "line" sheets that have been enclosed in the materials needed. With this, they can practice and decidewhich line they like the most.

## Detailed Techniques:

Straight Lines: Understanding the stability andstructure they provide.
Curved Lines: Exploring the fluidity and dynamismthey bring to art.

## Step 2: Creating Art with Lines (15 minutes):

- Teacher's Explanation:
  - "Now, let's create art using various line techniques. Unleash your creativity and experiment with different line styles!"
- Activity: Drawing Scenes with Diverse Line Styles
  - Students create drawings incorporating differentline types to represent scenes or emotions.

# - Detailed Techniques:

- Zigzag Lines: Expressing energy and movement.
- Dotted Lines: Creating texture and patterns.

# Step 3: Collaborative Team Artwork (10 minutes):

  - Students collaborate in teams to create a largeartwork using various line techniques.

- Parallel Lines: Understanding the visual impact of parallellines in art.

## **Step 4: Creative Storytelling with Lines (10 minutes):**

- Activity: Line-Based Storytelling
  - Students use lines to create a visual story on paper, emphasizing different line styles to conveynarrative elements.
- Detailed Techniques:
  - Squiggly Lines: Representing excitement or chaos.
  - Horizontal Lines: Conveying calm or stability.

## Step 5: Gallery and Final Talk (5 minutes):

- Teacher's Explanation:
  - "It's time to showcase our creative line artworks and stories! Share your inspirations and discoveries with your classmates."
- Activity: Exhibition and Final Talk
  - Students exhibit their artworks and engage in a final talk about their learnings and experiences
